



## RISK ASSESSMENT FOR OVER 18s

This Risk Assessment covers the situation where students over 18 are sharing residential accommodation with students under 18.

Although we do not normally enrol students over 18 onto residential courses there could be circumstances where this will happen.

This Risk Assessment is written in the context that over 18s are adults and will be sharing facilities with under 18-year-olds who are legally children.

These 18 year old students have been accepted onto our residential courses; they are part of the same cohort as other students who are not yet 18.

Where we decide to accept students over 18 onto residential courses with students under 18 we manage the bulk of risks by expecting these students to behave in the same way as the under 18s; even though they are legally adults. For example they are not allowed to drink alcohol or to smoke. This agreement forms part of our accepting the students onto the courses. We will deal with individual parental request forms on a case by case basis but will make decisions in the best interests of all the students at the residential centre rather than one particular group. Student who are over 18, and accepted onto the course, will still be studying in full time school education at the same level as other students on the programme.
